The seminar was given by John Lombardo and Phil Clifford from the Medical College of Wisconsin. One of the underlying messages is that job–seekers can create their own "luck" by being prepared to take advantage of opportunities when they present themselves. The speakers provided useful tips for setting measurable and obtainable goals, either within their current positions or when looking for new positions

They also talked about the importance of networking and how to leverage relationships that you may already have. Lastly, they gave several resources for job searches, networking and "expanding you vision" across scientific disciplines. The event kicked off outside the Baldwin Auditorium, Northwestern University's Lurie Cancer Center in downtown Chicago, with buffet dinner and refreshments graciously provided by Abbott, and the opportunity to drop off resumes for Abbott job opportunities, as

Congratulations, Prof. Ramille Shah!

April- Congratulations to our board member Ramille Shah, on the birth of her new baby girl, Sofia! New mother Ramille is also an Assistant Professor of Materials, Science and Engineering at Northwestern University since 2009. Her group focuses on developing new strategies for creating novel and practical biomaterials for the repair and regeneration of tissues damaged by disease or traumatic injury. In particular, they focus on the development of bioactive scaffolds having varying mechanical and biological properties sufficient for the regeneration or augmentation of musculoskeletal tissues such as cartilage, bone, meniscus, tendon, and ligament. After graduating

fom McCormick School of Engineering at NU in 2000, she went on to graduate school at MIT, where her research in Myron Spector's laboratory involved cartilage tissue engineering. This was followed in 2006 by a post-doctoral position at NU again in Prof. Stupp's lab on regenerative medicine.

June 2011 Scientist of the Month: Margrit Urbanek For her doctorate thesis, Margrit studied growth hormone receptor expression in human placentas with Dr. Stephen Liebhaber. After receiving her doctoral degree in Molecular Biology from the University of Pennsylvania in 1993, Margrit looked for a post-doctoral position that would allow her to unite her interests in genetics and Native American ancestry. At the National Institutes of Health (NIH), she worked on one project that focused on the population substructure of Native American populations of the American Southwest. Dr. Urbanek secured tenure track positions at Northwestern University's Chicago campus in 2001.

May 2011 Scientist of the Month: Julie Kim. Julie received a Microbiology degree from the University of Toronto in 1990. She then went on to receive a Ph.D in Cellular and Molecular Biology from Laval University where she studied with Dr. Patricia Quinn and Dr. Michel Fortier. Her PhD research introduced her to reproductive biology, but she implemented her microbiology background to study how infectious agents affect the bovine endometrium. After graduate school, Julie moved to the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC) to train with Dr.Asgi Fazleabas from 1995–1998. In 1998, Julie joined the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at UIC as a Research Assistant Professor and continued to research decidualization of the endometrium but with a focus on the progesterone receptor. Currently, Julie is an Assistant Professor at Northwestern University in the Obstetrics and Gynecology Department.

April 2011 Scientist of the Month: Lisa Gilbert–Hill. It has been a life–long passion for science led Lisa to major in biology and dabble in pharmacy courses at Xavier University of Louisiana. Lisa finished her bachelor's degree in biology at Governors State University in University Park, Illinois, in Chicago's south suburbs. With advice from her advisors at Governors State, Lisa decided to pursue a Master's degree in Analytical Chemistry. Her master's project with Dr. Karen D'Arcy focused on chelating agents used to remove contaminants from well water.

Highlights

In the news

May – Discover magazine reported last month how women are now catching up to men in the upper ranks of science. In 2009, five of the 13 Nobel Laureates were women and in that same year, women earned more than half of the doctorates awarded in the US. But women remain underrepresented in their fields and are still finding it difficult to gain equal treatment. Discover's Sheril Kirshenbaum recently sat down with four leading female scientists to ask them about how the research community can begin to "bridge the gap" and make the most of the women working in science. April – Sally Rockey is NIH's Deputy Director for Extramural Research, blogged about a report that show small differences in the success rates or funding rates between women and men for most research programs. Looking specifically at the R01 program, women had small and what appear to be persistently lower funding rates than men (26% vs. 28%), presumably because men submit more applications per person than women. However a bright spot is that women and men awardees both received the same percentage of requested direct costs (87.5%) and women actually received larger awards than men. AWIS was founded in 1971 at the annual meeting of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology, after a series of champagne brunches organized by the informal women's caucus. AWIS focused on advocacy for women in science across all scientific and technical disciplines and at all educational levels. AWIS was founded to sue the NIH and demand that they place women on their review panels. They sued, and they won. It is now 2011, and we are celebrating 40 years in 2011!
